Also we would like to have a quota of 500 for the community of Clyde River for a whole year. This would include anybody who is a Nunavut Land Beneficiary.

Out of the 500 Caribou allowed to be hunted we would like this break down.

100 females allowed to be catch

400 male allowed to be catch, for a total of 500 Caribou's.

During summer time they would have to walk a very long distance in search of Caribou, they were looking for Caribou so they could have the skin as their clothing and the meat as their food, if they caught enough Caribou they sometimes stash the Caribou meat for winter time so they could have meat in the winter.

Back then when we were in search of Caribou we were walking with our dogs, some years there was hardly any snow on the ground so we had to improvise on dragging the Caribou meat, we sometimes use Polar Bear hide as our sled or bearded seal skin. The terrain is not always smooth, we sometimes have to go through rough rock, go through ice cold rivers to cross to the other side.

Back then the hunters did not seem to think that the Caribou are declining. It seems that in some years there are lots of Caribou and some years there are fewer(life cycle).

We will probably see a lot of Caribou sooner or later because they are always wondering around, looking for food and go to their mating grounds and calfing area.

Our hunters have to go a very long distance to search for Caribou. They usually travel a day or two to reach the place where they would like to hunt for Caribou. Sometimes the hunters are out hunting for 1 week or longer searching for Caribou. They sometimes come home empty handed even if they were out of town searching for Caribou for a week or longer.

So I would like to see the Caribou hunt continue so our hunters can go Caribou hunt and provide food for the Community of Clyde River.
