Re: Environment and Climate Change Canada's request for an NWMB decision on the proposed listing of the Transverse Lady Beetle as a species of Special Concern under the federal *Species at Risk Act*, and its potential occurrence in Nunavut

Dear Minister McKenna

At the Nunavut Wildlife Management Board's (NWMB or Board) December Regular Meeting (RM-004-2017), Environment and Climate Change Canada presented a *Proposal for NWMB Decision* regarding the Board's involvement in the listing of the Transverse Lady beetle as a species of Special Concern under the federal *Species at Risk Act*. The Board considered this request at its In-Camera Meeting (IC-004-2017) on December 7th, 2017 and passed the following resolution:

RESOLVED that, pursuant to Section 5.2.34(f) of the *Nunavut Agreement*, the NWMB exercise its discretion to <u>not</u> perform its decision-making function regarding the proposed listing of the Transverse Lady Beetle under the federal *Species at Risk Act*.

In making its decision, the Board considered that there are currently no known occurrences of the Transverse Lady Beetle in Nunavut. If future surveys confirm the presence of the Transverse Lady Beetle in the Nunavut Settlement Area, consultation with affected Nunavut communities and NWMB approval will be necessary as part of Environment and Climate Change Canada's development of recovery documents. Recently the Board made a similar decision regarding the listing of Flooded Jellyskin under the federal *Species at Risk Act.*

In addition, at its December 2nd, 2015 In-Camera Meeting (IC-007-2015), the NWMB initiated a process to draft a policy regarding (i) what procedurally fair processes it will follow for its listing and recovery document decision-making functions for a species/population that currently appears to have a limited or unknown range in Nunavut, and (ii) under what conditions it will decide to exercise its *Nunavut Agreement* Section 5.2.34 discretion to <u>not</u> perform its listing and management plan/recover strategy/action plan/critical habitat decision-making functions. This NWMB policy is still under development.

Dear Mr. Shewchuk:

Thank you for your correspondence of December 19, 2017, concerning the Nunavut Wildlife Management Board's determination that it does not have decision-making authority in relation to two of the species (the Torngat Mountains population of caribou and the transverse lady beetle) that are now eligible to be added to Schedule 1 (the List of Wildlife Species at Risk) to the *Species at Risk Act*. I regret the delay in responding.

The Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) assessed the Torngat Mountains population of caribou as endangered and the transverse lady beetle as special concern. I received these assessments, along with those of 54 other species, from COSEWIC on October 24, 2017.

I recognize that the Board's determination is consistent with the absence of known occurrences in Nunavut for these two species. Should these species be added to the List, and if at some future date they are found to occur within Nunavut, the Board will be consulted in the development of the recovery documents as you requested.

In addition, I understand that the Nunavut Wildlife Management Board recently shared its Policy Concerning the Crown's Duty to Consult and, Where Appropriate, Accommodate Indigenous Groups, which expands upon the circumstances of species for which the Board may choose to exercise its discretion to exclude itself from decision-making functions, consistent with the Nunavut Land Claims Agreement. Environment and Climate Change Canada is currently reviewing this information and will provide you with feedback shortly.

I appreciate your sharing the Nunavut Wildlife Management Board's determinations with respect to the Torngat Mountains population of caribou and the transverse lady beetle.
