• 1998: 300,000

• 2003: 250,000

 Overharvest of shellfish on wintering grounds in Europe is thought to be the reason for the population decline



Proposed Status of rufa: Endangered


• 1980's: 100,000 to 150,000

• 2005: 18,000 to 20,000

 Severe reduction in horseshoe crab eggs on their resting stop in the United States during the northern migration

Critical Habitat

- Habitat necessary for survival and reproduction
- It will be described in either the Recovery Strategy or the Action Plan
- Once Critical Habitat is described, it will be illegal to destroy it



Critical Habitat for rufa Red Knots...

- Critical habitat in Nunavut will likely be where they nest.
- Canadian Wildlife
 Service will work with
 communities and
 government to identify
 and protect critical
 habitat.
- NWMB will be asked to approve critical habitat.
