# Dene ts'ılı (way of life) Dene 2020 (law) grounded in stories

• Respect, sharing

#### Four program areas (harvest, habitat, governance, knowledge)

- ?ekwé gha máhsı ts'ınıwe (ceremonial harvest)
- Dene béré kats'ınıwe (alternative harvest)



- Traditional Dene structures more effective than TAH
   More comprehensive conservation tools
- Dene code or enforcement system (ENR as last resort)
   Majority yárégo (younger male) and minimal tsída (female) ceremonial harvest
- ►TAH "only if required for conservation" (SDMCLCA 13.5.2)

# RIGHTS, RESPONSIBILITY, DENE TS'ĮLĮ

"Dehlá Got'ine have a constitutionally-protected right to hunt caribou, but hunting is integral to the culture and survival of Dehlá Got'ine. It is more than a right – it is a sacred responsibility that must be fulfilled for the Dehlá Got'ine and the caribou to maintain their relationship."


